






LOWELL HALL CONFERENCE HEADQUARTERS



ABOUT THE COVER...

A photograph of an ivory statuette of the beautiful Hindu goddess Sarasvati graces the cover of this Conference Program accompanied here by an invocation to her powers over the creative arts, in particular music & poetry, learning & science.

Sarasvati has a history reaching as far back as the Vedas where she appeared as a water deity, goddess of the river which bore her name. She is said to have invented Sanskrit and is represented as a graceful woman wearing a crescent moon on her brow. Sarasvati rides a swan or peacock, and is often seen sitting on a lotus flower. She holds a vina in most representations of her.

The powers of wisdom and learning, the powers of Sarasvati, symbolize the desire to share and exchange knowledge.
