

David Shulman "How to Wake Up in Sanskrit (or Tamil or Telugu)"

Friday, 6:45 pm - 7:45 pm Wisconsin Ballroom (second floor)

A tantalizing and remarkably rich poetic genre in Sanskrit and other South Asian languages is the suprabhatam "wake-up-call". Usually it is sung at dawn, or sometimes a bit earlier, by bards, courtiers, or priests in order to wake up a royal personage or a deity. These wake-up-calls, rarely studied in their own right, reveal a characteristic set of themes and modes such as detailed naturalistic observation, attempts to blackmail the addressee to get out of bed, mostly melancholy erotic notes, grammar exercises, riddles meant to get the listener's mind into gear, and probing explorations of various mental states (sleep, half-sleep, insomnia, piercing insight) and of the crucial mental faculty of attentiveness. The lecture will offer a taste of these poems in Sanskrit, Tamil, and Telugu– in lieu of an evening lullaby.

David Shulman is Professor Emeritus at the Hebrew University, Jerusalem. He was trained in Tamil by John Marr at the School of Oriental and African Studies, London (1972-1976). He has authored twenty-some books, several of them in close and fruitful collaboration with Velcheru Narayana Rao, Yigal Bronner, Don Handelman, and S. Ramakrishnan. A specialist in the languages, literatures, and cultural history of south India, he is now heading a European Research Council five-year grant on "The New Ecology of Expressive Modes in Early-Modern South India" (NEEM).

Ananya Vajpeyi

Ananya Vajpeyi is a Fellow & Associate Professor at the Centre for the Study of Developing Societies, New Delhi. She is the 2019-2020 Visiting Fellow at CRASSH (Cambridge), working at the intersection of intellectual history, political theory & critical philology. Her book, Righteous Republic: The Political Foundations of Modern India (2012) won Harvard's Thomas J. Wilson Memorial Prize, the Crossword Award for Non-Fiction (2013) and the Tata Prize for Non-Fiction (2013). It was listed as a 'Book of the Year' (2012) by The Guardian and The New Republic. Her latest book is a Festschrift for Ashis Nandy, A Life in Dissent, published by Oxford University Press (2018). She is working on an intellectual biography of Dr. B.R. Ambedkar. She was educated at Jawaharlal Nehru University; Oxford University as a Rhodes Scholar, and the University of Chicago, where she earned her PhD in South Asian Languages and Civilizations. She has taught at the School of International and Public Affairs, Columbia University; the History Department of the University of Massachusetts (Boston) and in South Asian Studies at the Ca' Foscari University of Venice, Italy. She has been a Kluge Fellow at the John W. Kluge Centre in the Library of Congress, a Global Ethics Fellow with the Carnegie Council for Ethics in International Affairs, New York and a Charles Wallace Fellow at CRASSH, Cambridge University (2017-18). She writes regularly for The Hindu newspaper, and occasionally for Foreign Affairs, World Policy Journal and the Los Angeles Review of Books. She is the current guest editor of Aroop: Journal of Arts and Ideas of the Raza Foundation, 2019-2021.



Iftikhar Dadi

Iftikhar Dadi is Associate Professor of History of Art, and Director of the South Asia Program at Cornell University. He is also co-director of Cornell's Institute for Comparative Modernities and has served as Chair of Cornell's Department of Art (2010-2014. Dadi teaches and researches modern and contemporary art from a global and transnational perspective, with emphasis on questions of methodology and intellectual history. His writings have focused on modernism and contemporary practice of Asia, the Middle East and their diasporas. Another research interest examines the film, media, and popular cultures of South Asia. His publications include Modernism and the Art of Muslim South Asia (2010), which received the 2010 Book Prize from the American Institute of Pakistan Studies. Informed postcolonial by theory and globalization studies, the work traces the emergence of modernism by selected artists from South Asia over the course of the twentieth century. Other publications include the edited monograph Anwar Jalal Shemza (2015), the coedited catalog Lines of Control (2012), and the co-edited reader Unpacking Europe (2001). Dadi currently serves on the editorial and advisory boards of Archives of Asian Art and Bio-Scope: South Asian Screen Studies, and was member of the editorial board of Art Journal (2007-11). He is advisor to the Hong Kong-based research organization Asia Art Archive. Co-curated exhibitions include Lines of Control on partitions and borders (Herbert F. Johnson Museum, 2012 and Nasher Museum, 2013). Iftikhar Dadi received his PhD in history of art at Cornell University.

One Day in the Season of Rain is Aparna Dharwadker and Vinay Dharwadker's new English translation of Ashadh ka Ek Din, the Hindi play by Mohan Rakesh (1925–1972) that transformed modern Indian theatre and founded a transnational paradigm of postcolonial drama in 1958.

Set entirely in fifth-century India, the play's action centers on the Sanskrit poet Kalidas and his muse, Mallika, who have grown up together in an impoverished village in the foothills of the Himalayas. When Kalidas is appointed the court poet in the royal capital of Ujjain, he abandons Mallika for his literary and political ambitions, with disastrous consequences for both.

Since nothing certain is known about the historical Kalidas, Rakesh reconstructs him brilliantly in three dimensions from his poems and plays and from the history of classical India, using an innovative array of modernist dramatic and theatrical techniques. The result is a dazzling portrait of the times, with a large cast of fully imagined characters, and an equally unforgettable love story of romance, fulfilment, abandonment, agony, cruelty, betrayal, and commitment.

Ashadh ka Ek Din is unique because it is the only play in world drama that takes a major historical artist in his maturity as its subject, and dramatizes not only the social, political, and intimate spheres of his life but also the conflicts that drive his career and his creativity. As its author, Rakesh won the Best Playwright award of the Sangeet Natak Akademi (national academy of performing arts) in 1959. Since then, the play has acquired an illustrious history of some fifty productions on the regional, national, and international stage, and has also entered the history of cinema with Mani Kaul's award-winning arthouse film of 1970, based on Rakesh's screenplay.

The English translation featured here was authorized by Rakesh's estate, and has been published in the Penguin Modern Classics series (2015). It premiered in a production directed by Neil Scharnick at the Department of Theatre, Carthage College (Kenosha, Wisconsin), in March 2010. The production was chosen subsequently for the Kennedy Center's American College Regional Theatre Festival at Michigan State University in January 2011. The staged reading at the 48th Annual South Asia Conference will be its debut performance in Madison

Sons and Fathers turns the creative lens upon the history of the film industry in Sri Lanka and its chequered path, by narrating the story of two generations of musicians who are caught in the whirlpool of political turbulence, the Tamil separatist war in the north and growing anti-Tamil sentiments in the country.

Walking the Walk

In India, the most visible face to the queer community – the Hijra community – also is the most victimised: rape, violence, discrimination, and even death are motifs of their daily existence. The film also brings attention to these gruesome acts of violence to raise awareness within the mainstream society. Walking as a form of protest against discrimination and exclusion has a long history in India. Dr. Ambedkar's historical "Mahad Satyagraha" walk in 1927 protested caste-based discrimination at one of its fundamental levels: access to water. Since then countless anti caste and anti colonial marches have galvanised the masses to fight for freedom – but these struggles must be kept vitally alive today. It is important to not only fight the British colonial residue in the form of an archaic Sec. 377 (that criminalizes homosexual behaviour) but also to fight the deep rooted stigma in the society and bring it to understand and accept alternate genders and sexualities. A public walk aims to do just that. Queer Indians have learned not to hesitate to talk the talk. This film shows how they also walk the walk.

1984, When The Sun Didn't Rise

Where Do The Children Play

On the night of December 2, 1984, an accident at the Union Carbide pesticide plant in Bhopal, India, released at least 30 tons of a highly toxic gas called methyl isocyanate, as well as a number of other poisonous gases. The pesticide plant was surrounded by shanty towns, leading to more than 600,000 people being exposed to the deadly gas cloud that night. The gases stayed low to the ground, causing victims throats and eyes to burn, inducing nausea, and many deaths. Estimates of the death toll vary from as few as 3,800 to as many as 16,000, but government figures now refer to an estimate of 15,000 killed over the years. Toxic material remains, and 30 years later, many of those who were exposed to the gas have given birth to physically and mentally disabled children. For decades, survivors have been fighting to have the site cleaned up, but they say the efforts were slowed when Michigan-based Dow Chemical took over Union Carbide in 2001. Human rights groups say that thousands of tons of hazardous waste remain buried underground, and the government has conceded the area is contaminated.

Salam - The First ***** Nobel Laureate

Salam – The First ****** Nobel Laureate' is a feature length documentary about Abdus Salam, the first Muslim to win the Nobel prize in Physics for the Standard Model—a holy grail in 20th century physics that postulated the Higgs Boson ('The God Particle') and was a step towards fulfilling Einstein's dream of unifying the laws of nature. The film captures his dramatic and ultimately tragic life's journey—from a small village in Pakistan to worldwide scientific acclaim—and his fraught relationship with his homeland, where he faced persecution for being a member of the "heretical" Ahmadiyya sub sect of Islam. Salam's legacy continues to be at the center of hard-fought culture wars in Pakistan between progressive segments and the religious right wing in a fundamental argument to define the constitutional nature of the state. At the cross roads between science and religion, Salam's story has huge relevance to contemporary Pakistan and the Muslim world beyond.

Chidra

Every couple of years, Ram Nath leaves his fields and buffaloes to play the part of human sacrifice in a hitherto undocumented mysterious ritual of purification in the Himalayan Valley of Kullu, North India. During the ritual, Ram Nath transforms from a highland peasant into the master of ceremonies, a powerful redeemer who cuts holes (chidra) in the fabric of society, collecting sins into a cosmic trap that only he can operate. Chidra follows Ram Nath through the ritual, revealing how men, gods, and mediums handle the dangerous substance of actions (karma) at the frontier of the Hindu cultural sphere.

Those who witnessed the scientific spirit fostered by the Enlightenment would scarcely believe that over 400 years later, Faith would still have an upper hand over Reason. Today as technologically advanced nations still debate the merits of Creationism and Evolution,

Today as technologically advanced nations still debate the merits of Creationism and Evolution, the developing world falls prey to blind faith and religious war. Everywhere privatization and a rush to corner ever-depleting natural resources has catapulted

corporates and their extreme right wing storm-troopers into power.

With the collapse of egalitarian values, democracy itself is under siege. That we, the temporarily comfortable, rarely notice, is because an embedded media controls both information and entertainment. We see what they want us to see and quickly tire of seeing anything that matters.

Reason takes us to a macrocosm – India, the world's largest democracy. Its eight chapters are a chilling account of how murder and mind control are being applied to systematically dismantle secular democracy in a country which once aspired not just to Liberty, Egalite and Fraternity, but to lead the post-war world out of its mindless spiral of violence and greed.

And yet the battle for Reason is not lost. Even as Brahminism (a priest ordained caste hierarchy that withheld knowledge from the working castes) drapes itself in the national flag and sends out its hit squads, resistance has not ended. For every brave rationalist gunned down or driven to suicide, many more take up the mantle.

Reason is then both a warning and a promise.

How the Annual Conference on South Asia Began

During the 1970-71 academic year, we were told by Washington that our three-year Center for South Asia grant would not be renewed unless we could give evidence showing how South Asian Studies at UW was reaching out to other institutions and providing services to the general public.

It was at that time that we devised a paradigm of seven concentric "spheres of outreach" whereby the benefits of understandings of South Asia could be disseminated more widely. Circles, or constituencies, of possible influence were demarcated as : (1) the department; (2) the college; (3) the UW campus; (4) campuses of the state; (5) campuses of the Mid-West; (6) campuses of North America; and (7) campuses of the whole world, especially in South Asia itself, as well as in Europe, Australia, Africa and the Far East. To this end, we decided to hold a major conference in Wisconsin. We contacted executives of Wingspread, the Frank Lloyd-Wright-designed conference center near Racine, Wisconsin, run by the Johnson Foundation. Describing what we wished to do, we asked for their help in hosting a pathbreaking event. They replied in the affirmative, indicating that they would gladly provide such meeting rooms as we needed, together with some food and refreshments. With this generous invitation in hand, we set about organizing panels and sending out invitations – to any and all South Asian scholars. We were astounded at the response, with scholars coming from near and far.

The very first Wisconsin Conference of South Asian Studies took place at Wingspread on the first weekend of November, 1971. The event was truly memorable. Among those who participated, revealing his scholarly prowess for the first time, was Velcheru Narayana Rao. His remarkable performance made a considerable impact upon the minds of all who heard him. Among others who were there was the late and noted Sanskritist J.A.B. ("Hans") Van Buitenen who gave his film production on Vedic Sacrifice in Pune. So also were Susanne and Lloyd Rudolph, as well as A.K. Ramanujan. Suffice it to say, there were some eighty to one hundred esteemed colleagues and scholars at that first conference.

The Second Annual Wisconsin Conference on South Asian Studies was held on the UW-Madison campus. This too was a resounding success, attracting many more participants. Then, because South Asia Center at Wisconsin wanted to demonstrate the wish, and fulfill the promise, of "reaching out" beyond the Madison campus, the Third Wisconsin Conference was held on the campus of UW-Oshkosh. Slowly, conference policies and procedural conventions were evolving so as to assure continuity, and some measure of control over the quality and quantity of panels for each conference. Each year's event was to be organized by a conference committee in which a blending of old and new members combined a sense of continuity with fresh energy and insights. Eventually, campus facilities became inadequate, so that in 2001 the venue was moved to the Concourse Hotel.

What has astounded all Center for South Asia faculty and staff at UW-Madison, and continues to astonish them to this day, is the reach of the Annual Conference on South Asia. With participants now coming from every continent, and numbering over one thousand each year, the event has obviously fulfilled a need that was felt world-wide. In metaphorical terms: it was as if a match were thrown onto a floor covered with gasoline. Fires that flare up among South Asianists who come to Wisconsin each year have continued to attract more and more onlookers and participants. While there are now many other South Asia Conferences, in different regions of North America and different regions of the world, the Annual Conference on South Asia remains the most well-attended and among the most attractive.

The role of many colleagues in bringing the Wisconsin Conference to its current level of quality and prestige can hardly be exaggerated. Joseph W. Elder and Manindra K. Verma both served on the first organizing committee. During his long tenure as department chair and center director, Manindra patiently and carefully developed the Annual Conference. Joe's continuing presence, throughout these years, has been ever ubiquitous. During the early years, staff work was done by Judith Paterson. Sharon Dickson, who took her place, also served for many years. B. Venkat Mani (Director), Lalita du Perron (Associate Director), Sarah Beckham (Interim Associate Director), and Bradley Grochocinski (Conference Organizer) carry on the day-to-day planning and administration. Many others, too many to mention, have faithfully served in bringing this annual event to its current level.
